media theory has long overlooked the built environment and its communicative capacity how built structures and spaces convey meaning through material embodiment and symbolization architecture as communication advances the idea that built environments function as media of communication using practice theory in conjunction with the concept of style this book is anchored in three historical determinants the quest for perfect proportion in buildings the belief in architectural determinism and the ongoing efforts within other media to influence how those who experience built environments understand them ross eaman explores how houses schools places of worship factories office buildings stores malls opera houses plazas and parks have meaning for people as subjective life worlds architecture as communication proposes media theory that articulates the social construction of meaning as a unique way of understanding the built environment one in which the users and observers of structures and spaces participate along with architects and designers architecture according to eaman encompasses the multiplicity of communication as human interaction preparing people for what they are about to encounter signalling how they should act and selectively enabling them to perform their expected role using examples across many historical periods and cultures architecture as communication argues that we judge our built environments by the values they communicate

how do buildings act with people and among people in the performances of life this collection of essays reveals a deep alliance between architecture and the performing arts uncovering its roots in ancient stories and tracing a continuous tradition of thought that emerges in contemporary practice with fresh insight the authors ask how buildings perform with people as partners rather than how they look as formal compositions they focus on actions the door that offers the possibility of making a dramatic entrance the window that frames a scene and the city street that is transformed in carnival the essays also consider the design process as a performance improvised among many players and offer examples of recent practice that integrates theater and dance this collection advances architectural theory history and criticism by proposing the lens of performance as a way to engage the multiple roles that buildings can play without reducing them to functional categories by casting architecture as spatial action rather than as static form these essays open a promising avenue for future

investigation for architects the essays propose integrating performance into design through playful explorations that can reveal intense relationships between people and place and among people in place such practices develop an architectural imagination that intuitively asks how might people play out their stories in this place and how might this place spark new stories questions such as these reside in the heart of all of the essays presented here together they open a position in the intersection between everyday life and staged performance to rethink the role of architectural design

how do we think about architecture historically and theoretically forty ways to think about architecture provides an introduction to some of the wide ranging ways in which architectural history and theory are being approached today the inspiration for this project is the work of adrian forty professor of architectural history at the bartlett school of architecture university college london ucl who has been internationally renowned as the uk s leading academic in the discipline for 40 years forty s many publications notably objects of desire 1986 words and buildings 2000 and concrete and culture 2012 have been crucial to opening up new approaches to architectural history and theory and have helped to establish entirely new areas of study his teaching at the bartlett has enthused a new generation about the exciting possibilities of architectural history and theory as a field this collection takes in a total of 40 essays covering key subjects ranging from memory and heritage to everyday life building materials and city spaces as well as critical theory philosophy literature and experimental design it refers to more immediate and topical issues in the built environment such as globalisation localism regeneration and ecologies concise and engaging entries reflect on architecture from a range of perspectives contributors include eminent historians and theorists from elsewhere such as jean louis cohen briony fer hilde heynen mary mcleod griselda pollock penny sparke and anthony vidler as well as forty s colleagues from the bartlett school of architecture including jain borden murray fraser peter hall barbara penner jane rendell and andrew saint forty ways to think about architecture also features contributions from distinguished architects such as tony fretton jeremy till and sarah wigglesworth and well known critics and architectural writers such as tom dyckhoff william menking and thomas weaver many of the contributors are former students of adrian forty through these diverse essays readers are encouraged to think about how architectural history and theory relates to their own research and design practices thus using the work of adrian forty as a catalyst for fresh and innovative thinking about architecture as a subject

pamphlet architecture was begun in 1977 by william stout and steven holl as an independent vehicle for dialogue among architects and has become a popular venue for publishing the works and thoughts of a younger generation of architects small in scale low in price but large in impact these books present and disseminate new and innovative theories the modest format of the books in the pamphlet architecture series belies the importance and magnitude of the ideas within

this book provides a clear sighted analysis which suggests that architectural design may yet shape and order the future of cities a clear argument that emerges is that to retain their future agency architects must understand the contours and ecologies of practice that constitute the global system of architectural production

readers will find this book offers them both insights into the nature of architectural practice in their own communities and surprising alternatives book jacket

using empathy as established by the vienna school of art history complemented by insights on how the mind processes visual stimuli as demonstrated by late 19th century psychologists and art theorists this book puts forward an innovative interpretative method of decoding the forms and spaces of modern buildings this method was first developed as scholars realized that the new abstract art appearing needed to be analysed differently than the previous figurative works since architecture experienced a similar development in the 1920s and 30s this book argues that the empathetic method can also be used in architectural interpretation while most existing scholarship tends to focus on formal and functional analysis this book proposes that modern architecture is too diverse to be reduced to a few common formal or ornamental features instead by relying on the viewer's innate psycho physiological perceptive abilities sensual and intuitive understandings of composition form and space are emphasized these aspects are especially significant because modern architecture lacks the traditional stylistic signs including building analyses it shows how by visually reducing cubical forms and spaces to linear configurations the exteriors and interiors of modern buildings can be interpreted via human perceptive abilities as dynamic movement systems commensurate with the new industrial transportation age this reveals an inner necessity these buildings express about themselves and their culture rather than just an explanation of how they are assembled and how they should be used the case studies highlight the contrasts between buildings designed by different architects rather than concentrating on the few features that relate them to the zeitgeist it analyses the buildings directly as the objects of study not indirectly as designs filtered through a philosophical or theoretical discourse the book demonstrates that with technology and science affecting culture

in light of the current political crisis around climate change what can architecture possibly contribute towards a new planetary imaginary of our contemporary environment beyond environmentalism and technological determinism instead of conceptualizing the idea of the environment as purely natural and in need of protection as solely a problem that needs to be managed or merely as the earth which limits the scope with a scalar bias can we speculate on architecture as a measure both to assess and to act upon the world architecture as measure is an elaboration on this question and on the disciplinary and cultural potentials of such a provocation it positions climate change as a cultural and political idea that requires a renewed architectural environmental imagination Othe book takes on this task by presenting a set of unconventional collisions between architecture and climate change which all extrapolate broader concerns of the city environment and geography through the lens of specific architectural questions such as form representation and materiality

architecture inside out demonstrates how architects can work closely with their clients to uncover both the existing and preferred ways that people inhabit and experience their space it also covers psychology and patterns of human activity

the fine arts are traditionally seen to have intrinsic value that is they are valuable in themselves but this poses a problem for architecture its works are designed to serve our purposes and therefore it is classed as functional carving out a new space edward winters argues why architecture is a fine art and finds a place for the fine art of architecture in the cultural environment in which we structure our lives winters reconciles intrinsic value as a fine art with extrinsic value as shelter security and comfort without collapsing into the modernist conception of functionalism he draws on the apollonian and the dionysian to resolve the apparent conflict between the two values the former requiring contemplative detached reflection the latter an engaged embodied entanglement with the festive mood inspired by the immediate situation architecture winters claims is to be regarded as functional but this functionality is subsumed under the intrinsic aesthetic value of living well introducing the main positions in the philosophy of architecture through the lens of the timeless argument about what constitutes art winters lays out a humanistic view of the medium and extends our understanding of aesthetics and the everyday

form and function followed food is universally true to be the fundamental law of architecture architecture as a time tunnel is a moment in time through the equation of architecture as a time tunnel generating an architectural space is simple the conceptual theoretical and philosophical foundation of a time tunnel architecture is easy i spend most of my time at home in this time of coronavirus pandemic staying at home feels so natural for me it is true that when you have a garden and a library you have everything you need even when i have all the opportunities to go back to work i decided to stay at home to work on my theory of architecture as a time tunnel that i started developing when i was taking bachelor of science in architecture at national university i had this feeling that this pandemic will only come to an end as soon as i finished crafting my book as a human being who constantly thinks of the future of humanity without having anxiety i dream that my theory would influence the so called new normal building code to the best of my knowledge and bricks of my being i just have to do the write thing i believe in the power of books books guided the trajectory of the human race those who do not believe in the power of books for sure they don't read books never underestimate an idea no matter how simple it is look around you the reality that you see today all came from an idea or the imagination though this book may appear simple how i arrived with this is a long story in retrospect my journey had influenced the theoretical conceptual and philosophical framework of architecture as a time tunnel the tree of knowledge is rich in flavor and ripeness forbidden means not for all not only i have eaten it's seeds i sow watered and nurtured now it bears fruits of love and labor that i want to share to the world i don t believe that architects are dumb in math neither should be it is said that mathematics is dying in architecture if architecture is a science it should do the math i spend most of time indoors no wonder why i love architectural spaces the beauty in architectural spaces as an invisible force that drives us all never bored me it is never empty it is full of air life and light i view architecture as a philosophy of science from the natural laws or physics i love physics because it is about a quest to know and to understand everything architecture on the other hand is about knowing and understanding as everything as you can so what is architecture as a time tunnel i ve been losing my sleep trying to think of the answer to this question but when i

heard my mother rachel singing this song by whitney houston on youtube karaoke through her rechargeable wireless bluetooth microphone the music and the lyrics perfectly captured the meaning of architecture as a time tunnel one moment in time architecture as a time tunnel is a moment in time very simple

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
