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studies of racism often focus on its devastating effects on the victims of prejudice but no discussion of race is complete without exploring the other side the ways in which some people or groups actually benefit deliberately or inadvertently from racial bias white privilege second edition the revision to the ground breaking anthology from paula rothenberg continues her efforts from the first edition two new essays contribute to the discussion of the nature and history of white power the concluding section again challenges readers to explore ideas for using the power and the concept of white privilege to help combat racism in their own lives brief inexpensive and easily integrated with other texts this interdisciplinary collection of commonsense non rhetorical readings lets educators incorporate discussions of whiteness and white privilege into a variety of disciplines including sociology english composition psychology social work women s studies political science and american studies

what does it look like to let go of whiteness whiteness promotes a form of hegemonic thinking which influences not only thought processes but also behavior within the academy working to dismantle the racism and whiteness that continue to keep oppressed people powerless and immobilized in academe requires sharing power opportunity and access removing barriers to the knowledge created in higher education is an essential part of this process the process of unhooking oneself from institutionalized whiteness certainly requires fighting hegemonic modes of thought and patriarchal views that persistently keep marginalized groups of academics in their station or at their institution in the explosive unhooking from whiteness resisting the esprit de corps editors hartlep and hayes continued the conversation they began in 2013 with unhooking from whiteness the key to dismantling racism in the united states this third and final volume focuses on the writers processes to let go of the pathology of whiteness the contributors in this book have once again come from an intersection of races ethnicities sexual identities and gender identities and includes conversations across these multiple intersections the editors move from preparedness on multicultural education toward actionable conversations that drive social justice agendas and have the power to eliminate educational inequities

this text aims to discover the shared lived experiences of white american female converts to islam in post 9 11 america it explores the increasingly hostile social climate faced by muslim americans as well as the spiritual social physical and mental integration of these women into the muslim american population in the united states rates of conversion to islam are rapidly increasing alongside islamophobic sentiment and hate crimes against muslims for a period of

time there was a lull in this negative sentiment however in light of the paris terror attacks the increased prominence of isis isil and the influx of refugees from syria anti muslim rhetoric is once again on the rise this volume analyzes how a singular collection of female converts have adapted to life in the united states in the shadow of 9 11

the reality of international relations and its academic study are still almost entirely constituted by men rethinking the man question is a crucial investigation and reinvigoration of debates about gender and international relations following on from the seminal the man question in international relations this book looks at the increasingly violent and toxic nature of world politics post 9 11 contributors including raewyn connell kimberley hutchings cynthia enloe kevin dunn and sandra whitworth consider the diverse theoretical and practical implications of masculinity for international relations in the modern world covering theoretical issues including masculine theories of war masculinity and the military cyborg soldiers post traumatic stress disorder and white male privilege the book also focuses on the ways in which masculinity configures world events from conscientious objection in south africa to porno nationalism in india from myths and heroes in kosovo to the makings of zimbabwe this essential work will define the field for many years to come
