this is the most authoritative and concise book on japanese haiku available what it is how it developed and how it is practiced in both japanese and english while many haiku collections are available to western readers few books combine both translated haiku with haiku written originally in english along with an analysis of individual poems and of the haiku form itself written by a leading scholar in the field kenneth yasuda was the first american to receive a doctorate in japanese literature from tokyo university japanese haiku has been widely acclaimed this edition is completely repackaged for a digital format and is the perfect book for lovers of poetry who do not have a solid background in haiku

a highly distilled form of japanese poetry haiku consists of seventeen syllables usually divided among three lines though brief they tell a story or paint a vivid picture leaving it to the reader to draw out the meanings and complete them in the mind s eye haiku often contains a hidden dualism near and far then and now etc and has a seasonal tie in as well as specific word images that reveal deeper layers in each poem this unique collection spans over 400 years 1488 1902 of haiku history by the greatest masters bashō issa shiki and many more in translations by top flight scholars in the field haiku commands enormous respect in japan now readers of poetry in

the west can savor these expressive masterpieces in this treasury compiled by noted writer faubion bowers who provides a foreword and many informative notes to the poems

this classic book is a collection and analysis of japanese haiku in the english language the haiku is a brief poetic form expressing a moment of insight no foreign form since the sonnet has so fascinated and challenged the poets of the english speaking world yet no scholar or critic until now has undertaken a definitive study of the problems of writing haiku in english this book the first of its kind examines english language haiku in the light of japanese form author joan giroux explicates the meaning and history of the japanese haiku its cultural background the creative process which gives it birth and the technical devices developed by japanese poets over the centuries examples by classic and contemporary poets including basho and buson shiki and hastutaro are given romanized japanese and in english translation poems in english from early efforts by ezra pound and wallace stevens to work of contemporaries like james hackett are discussed and evaluated wherever possible comparisons are made contrast indicated and suggestions given with a rare sensitivity to the poetic possibilities of both languages and keen appreciation of the unique qualities of both cultures

a revelation sunday times books of the year 2018 the first penguin anthology of japanese haiku in vivid new translations by adam l kern now a global poetry the haiku was originally a japanese verse form that flourished from the sixteenth to nineteenth centuries although renowned for its brevity usually running three lines long in seventeen syllables and by its use of natural imagery to make zen like observations about reality in fact the haiku is much more it can be erotic funny crude and mischievous presenting over a thousand exemplars in vivid and engaging translations this anthology offers an illuminating introduction to this widely celebrated if misunderstood art form adam l kern s new translations are accompanied here by the original japanese and short commentaries on the poems as well as an introduction and illustrations from the period

no other asian poetic form has so intrigued and beguiled the english speaking world as the japanese haiku even before world war i such imagist poets as ezra pound amy lowell and john gould fletcher were experimenting with the form at that time pound well described the haiku as an intellectual and emotional complex in an instant of time indeed it is the haiku s sense of immediacy and its precision that continue to appeal to poets and poetry lovers today in recent decades there has been an upsurge of interest in the haiku leading to a number of critical studies of the form studies that have now culminated in the present book this insightful work not only considers the haiku itself but also the extremely important yet often ignored renga or linked verse form out of which the haiku grew no deep understanding of the haiku is possible without familiarity with the renga one hundred frogs begins with a detailed history and description of

the renga and haiku many renowned japanese poets most notably basho are represented in the wealth of translated poetry that illustrates the text to bring this history up to date a discussion of modern japanese and western haiku is included next the author discusses the craft of translating renga and haiku and explores recent developments in the two forms offering a representative selection of modern works to reveal the myriad choices open to translators of renga and haiku the author provides an in depth analysis of one of japan s most famous haiku basho s poem about a frog in a pond and presents a compilation of over one hundred translations and variations of the poem the book closes with short anthologies of english language renga and haiku by contemporary western poets that offer a tantalizing glimpse of the diversity of expression possible with these two forms an instructive celebration of the renga and haiku this volume furnishes a new perspective on the work of some of japan s outstanding poets of old and lays a foundation for the appreciation of the renga and haiku that are being written today

richard wright one of the early forceful and eloquent spokesmen for black americans author of the acclaimed native son and black boy discovered the haiku in the last eighteen months of life he attempted to capture through his sensibility as an african american the elusive zen discipline and beauty in depicting man's relationship not only to his fellow man as he had in the raw and forceful prose of his fiction but to the natural world in all he wrote over 4 000 haiku here are the 817 he personally chose wright's haiku disciplined and steeped in beauty display a universality that transcends both race and color without ever denying them wright wrote his haiku obsessively in bed in cafes in restaurants in both paris and the french countryside they offered him a new form of expression and a new vision with the threat of death constantly before him he found in them inspiration beauty and insights fighting illness and frequently bedridden deeply upset by the recent loss of his mother ella wright continued as his daughter notes in her introduction to spin these poems of light out of the gathering darkness

far beyond the field is a first of its kind anthology of haiku by japanese women collecting translations of four hundred haiku written by twenty poets from the seventeenth century to the present by arranging the poems chronologically makoto ueda has created an overview of the way in which this enigmatic seventeen syllable form has been used and experimented with during different eras at the same time the reader is admitted to the often marginalized world of female experience in japan revealing voices every bit as rich and colorful and perhaps even more lyrical and erotic than those found in male haiku listen for instance to chiyojo who worked in what has been long thought of as the dark age of haiku during the eighteenth century but who composed exquisitely fine poems tracing the smallest workings of nature or katsuro nobuko who wrote powerfully erotic poems when she was widowed after only two years of marriage and here too is a voice from today mayuzumi madoka whose meditations on romantic love represent a fresh new approach to haiku

this book of haiku is a collection of haiku i wrote mostly in college when i found myself bored in classes there are over 200 of them in my collection and they run a gamut of different topics although haiku are usually associated with nature i wanted to use this simple poetic form to take a look at more serious and deeper topics so in a way this is a book of haiku for adults

the art of haiku poetry besides plain spokenness embodies a beauty and power that captivates hearts and minds everywhere it is one of the enduring literary forms and for good reason traditionally haiku has emphasized a close relationship with the glories of nature most all appreciate a more intimate connection to that fascinating realm in this case an expanded consciousness of nature s aliveness enhanced by the poetic perception the practice or technique of haiku is readily understood with stylistic characteristics quite elementary there is much satisfaction derived from the creative process appealing format and dynamism of these verses for

readers and writers of haiku it is an uplifting engagement with the aesthetics of nature when creatively involved we also grow as persons in touch with the artistic longings of our human nature this book teaches how to relate to and carefully consider that natural world all around us you will learn to communicate these observations and personal visions with sentiment and succinctly as a poet would indeed the volume is dedicated to all of us the poet of any kind in every heart its contents will thrill and enthrall you with compelling insights to the method striking examples of this sublime little art form

the book should engage the person interested in reading haiku poetry for pleasure as well as newcomers to the writing of haiku parts of the book allow for interaction with the author by interested haiku writers the author presents in a scholarly way his research into haiku and its history as well as its previous uses he talks about haiku of today and for the future with ample references on haiku to be found in the literature in so doing he takes the reader on a poetical journey through his life autobiographically speaking which makes the book more interesting and human and not pedantic he uses his haiku to speak out on such topics as love nature war and peace and 9 11 his poetry describes his years growing up in new york city during the great depression his stint as a combat marine in world war ii his college days at n y u his colorectal cancer and how he deals with it his work with hiv aids drugs and severely disabled adults his buddhist inclinations and living in the now his feelings about the destruction of the twin towers some of his poems will come across as therapeutic while others may be seen as cathartic

american haiku eastern philosophies and modernist poetics traces the genesis and development of haiku in japan as it transformed over the years and eventually made its way to the western world yoshinobu hakutani analyzes the prominent eastern philosophies expressed through haiku such as confucianism and zen and the aesthetic principles of yugen sabi and wabi hakutani discusses several reinventions of haiku from matsuo basho s transformation of the classic haiku to masaoka shiki s modernist perspectives expressing subjective thoughts and feelings and eventually to yone noguchi s introduction of haiku to the western world through w b yeats and ezra pound hakutani argues that the adoption and transformation of haiku is one of the most popular east west artistic cultural and literary exchanges to have taken place in modern and postmodern times

in the past hundred years haiku has gone far beyond its japanese origins to become a worldwide phenomenon with the classic poetic form growing and evolving as it has adapted to the needs of the whole range of languages and cultures that have embraced it this proliferation of the joy of haiku is cause for celebration but it can also compel us to go back to the beginning to look at haiku s development during the centuries before it was known outside japan this in depth study of haiku history begins with the great early masters of the form like basho buson and issa

and goes all the way to twentieth century greats like santoka it also focuses on an important aspect of traditional haiku that is less known in the west haiku art all the great haiku masters created paintings called haiga or calligraphy in connection with their poems and the words and images were intended to be enjoyed together enhancing each other and each adding its own dimension to the reader s and viewer s understanding here one of the leading haiku scholars of the west takes us on a tour of haiku poetry s evolution providing along the way a wealth of examples of the poetry and the art inspired by it

a guide to haiku uses examples from around the world to convey the importance of the seasons

haiku should be written as swiftly as a woodcutter fells a tree or a swordsman leaps at a dangerous enemy basho the father of haiku poetry was of samurai stock himself and so wrote these words from experience

this volume features dozens of basho's poems as well as works by his predecessors and ten of his disciples kikaku ransetsu joso and kyoroku among them intended principally for readers with no knowledge of japanese literature the book includes the original japanese text a transliteration and english translations for each verse

everything you want to know about haiku written by one of the foremost experts in the field and the finest translator of contemporary japanese poetry into american english gary snyder who doesn't love haiku it is not only america's most popular cultural import from japan but also our most popular poetic form instantly recognizable more mobile than a sonnet loved for its simplicity and compression as well as its ease of composition haiku is an ancient literary form seemingly made for the twittersphere jack kerouac and langston hughes wrote them ezra pound and the imagists were inspired by them hallmark s made millions off them first grade students across the country still learn to write them but what really is a haiku where does the form originate who were the original japanese poets who wrote them and how has their work been translated into english over the years the haiku form comes down to us today as a cliché a three line poem of 5 7 5 syllables and yet its story is actually much more colorful and multifaceted and of course to write a good one can be as difficult as writing a homeric epic or it can materialize in an instant of epic inspiration in on haiku hiroaki sato explores the many styles and genres of haiku on both sides of the pacific from the classical haiku of basho issa and zen monks to modern haiku about swimsuits and atomic bombs to the haiku of famous american writers such as j d salinger and allen ginsburg as if conversing over beers in your favorite pub sato explains everything you wanted to know about the haiku in this endearing and pleasurable book destined to be a classic in the field

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
