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first published in 1961 the psychology of jung presents a critical and historical interpretation of carl jung s psychology in this book the author describes himself as an independent student and as an interested though uncommitted observer and attempts to explain and reconcile drawbacks contradictions discrepancies and incongruities of jungian theory in particular its indefiniteness its mystical semireligious characteristics its emphasis on visual imagery and mythological symbolisms it brings themes like historical background early and intermediate period the jungian therapy and related insights jung s

critique of freud and psychotherapy changes in jung s work and its appeal and jungian psychology and its appeal this is a must read for students of psychoanalysis and psychology

the contributions of carl jung to understanding of the human psyche are immense starting as freud s most famous disciple jung soon broke away from his mentor to follow his own lines of investigation and discovery many of jung s ideas are now considered fundamentals in the study of the mind but other more controversial theories dealing with the psychological relevance of alchemy esp astrology and occultism are only now being seriously examined this condensation and summary of jung s life and work by two eminent psychology professors is written with deep understanding and extraordinary clarity and along with its companion volume a primer of jungian psychology is essential reading for anyone interested in the hidden depths of the mind

because of the size and depth of jung s collected writings many readers though interested in his ideas find themselves intimidated by them and read only overviews of jungian psychology rather than jung s own work this book is organized therefore as a guide to jung s 19 volume collected works it provides an entree into each important concept in jung s work through a brief explanation followed by a list of graded readings related writings by other authors are also recommended so that readers can obtain a fuller and deeper understanding of the contribution of jungian psychology

the language of jung s writings and of analytical psychology generally is sometimes difficult to understand this guide in dictionary format combines scholarship and historical accuracy with a stimulating critical attitude

they deserve in this concise introduction anthony stevens explains clearly the basic concepts of jungian psychology the collective unconscious complex archetype shadow persona anima animus and the individuation of the self he examines jung s views on such disparate subjects as myth religion alchemy sychronicity and the psychology of gender differences and he devotes separate chapters to the stages of life jung s theory of psychological types the interpretation of dreams the practice of jungian analysis and to the unjust allegation that jung was a nazi sympathizer finally he argues that jung s visionary powers and profound spirituality have helped many to find an alternative set of values to the arid materialism prevailing in western society about the series the very short introductions series from oxford university press contains hundreds of titles in almost every subject area these pocket sized books are the perfect way to get ahead in a new subject quickly our expert authors combine facts analysis perspective new ideas and enthusiasm to make interesting and challenging topics highly readable

historically there were more male therapists and more female patients just as society has changed so has therapy jung s psychology includes the feminine aspects of a man and the masculine parts of a woman of course today it is a complete psyche or an inner marriage in the background would be a mandala which also represents wholeness and individuation synchronicity is an acausal but meaningful relationship which therapy honors jung s psychology also includes the shadow which represents what has been left out the ego in analytical psychology stands for the center of consciousness in the personal self whereas the self is the center of the psyche and totality and links one to spiritual wholeness hence the individuated person has confession conscious and unconscious archetypes complexes anima and animus or syzygy numinous gnosis typology symbols dreams the shadow and active imagination these aspects of analytical psychology are then discussed and illustrated with a case history in sum the ego is secondary to the self in an individuated person both a mandala and jungian therapy and analysis are associated with wholeness

according to carl jung the goal of human life is self realization we have to strive to become whole deep down we are all creative beings and we have to make use of our creativity to become what we really are kast explores jung s concept of the human being and describes the path to wholeness which since jung is known as the individuation process it becomes clear that wholeness is only possible through the interplay between conscious and unconscious however the two have different languages consciousness uses word logic whereas the unconscious uses dream logic both languages would be forever foreign to each other were it not for symbols which mediate between the two our unconscious encodes its knowledge in symbols which we then have to translate into the language of our consciousness thus symbols are focal points of psychic development and it is through them that we can become whole human beings jung taught us the techniques with which we can make the creative core of the unconscious available to consciousness kast explains them by using numerous examples from her daily work as a therapist she shows us how psychological problems can be overcome by working on the symbols in which they express themselves in a language that can be readily grasped by the general reader kast goes on to explain the basic thought of jungian psychotherapy covering the correlation between symbols and complexes with a special emphasis on the ego complex the healing function of the archetypes and how they appear in and interact with symbols and symbols in transference and countertransference powerful tools in psychotherapy kast also discusses the interplay of psychosomatic diseases and symbols the dynamics of symbols is not only of immediate interest to all psychologists and their patients it is of direct concern to everyone who has the desire to become a whole human being

the current neuroscientific research in the field of emotion studies highlights a paradigm of scientific research that must be categorized as functional science as functional science the neuroscientific theory of the neuron doctrine combined with a jungian theory of the complex doctrine hold significant potential for a natural human science and a psychological study of affectivity though researchers utilize psychological constructs similar to those proposed by carl jung there appears to be a fear of jung that is a professional fear of invoking jung s name or his psychological research one familiar with jung s works notice similar terminology ideas and even conclusions the marginalization and neglect of jung s psychological insights from a serious empirical scientific approach to psychology is due to many factors jung did not reduce psychological experience to the body or brain a reductive science does not consider seriously the reality of the psyche this work is an initial contribution to a psychological and neurological study of personal emotional experience

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comprehensive description of jungian thought addressed particularly to those considering analysis and to therapists of other back grounds who wish to better understand the clinical application of jung s model of the psyche

briggs type indicator and elements that informed the big five personality model this updated and unabridged edition provides a fresh accessible translation of carl jung s scientific writings originally intended for an academic audience versed in psychiatric and philosophical discourse of the early twentieth century the translation is accompanied by a thought provoking afterword by the translator which explores the philosophical foundations historical setting and lasting impact of jung s ideas tracing his intellectual journey from his early clinical work under freud to his later metaphysical philosophy as expressed in works such as aion and his theories on synchronicity in addition to elucidating this work alone the afterword situates it within the broader structure of jung s intellectual and clinical development offering readers a deeper understanding of his early contributions as well as those of schopenhauer einstein nietzsche and other influences on early psychology who shaped his thinking supplemental materials including a detailed timeline of jung s life and work place his theories within their personal cultural and historical dimensions allowing readers to grasp how biographical circumstances and intellectual currents of his era shaped his theoretical innovations this edition allows both newcomers and seasoned scholars to appreciate the origins and significance of jungian psychology from its humble roots in swiss psychiatric hospitals to its modern implications across psychology literature and cultural studies this landmark work introduces jung s theory of psychological types which categorizes people according to their dominant psychological functions thinking feeling sensation and intuition and attitudes introversion and extraversion creating eight possible type combinations jung s typology offers a structured approach to understanding personality differences and has since become one of his most widely recognized contributions forming the basis for personality assessments including the myers briggs type indicator which expanded his system into sixteen distinct types the book argues that each individual develops a dominant function and attitude while the others remain less differentiated and largely unconscious creating characteristic patterns of perception and judgment jung contends that recognizing one s own type and the types of others can reduce interpersonal conflict and promote psychological development as individuals become aware of their blind spots and compensatory mechanisms the theory holds that psychological health requires some degree of balance and integration among the functions though complete equilibrium remains impossible given the limitations of conscious awareness in its philosophical scope psychological types also critiques historical figures and movements through the lens of psychological biases inherent in different types jung interprets the theological debates of early christianity and the philosophical divide between nietzsche and schopenhauer as manifestations of different psychological typologies arguing that intellectual disagreements often stem from differences in psychological orientation rather than purely logical considerations this approach reveals the ubiquity of psychological structures in shaping culture and thought suggesting that philosophy religion and art all bear the imprint of their creators dominant functions and attitudes jung s typological theory aids in understanding interpersonal dynamics and self awareness while also serving as a structure for addressing conflicts within and between individuals pointing toward the path of individuation and psychological wholeness the work acknowledges that each type has inherent strengths and weaknesses and that no type is superior to another though certain types may be better suited to particular vocations or life circumstances by recognizing typological differences as natural variations rather than defects jung sought to create a psychology that honored human diversity while identifying universal processes of psychic development

essays by an international team of jungian analysts form a critical introduction to jung and analytical psychology

jung and the question of science brings to the foreground a controversial issue at the heart of contemporary jungian studies the perennial debate echoes jung s own ambivalence while jung defined his analytical psychology as a science he was aware that it did not conform to the conventional criteria for a scientific study in general psychology this ambivalence is carried into twenty first century analytical psychology as well as affecting perceptions of jung in the academia here eight scholars and practitioners have pooled their expertise to examine both the history and present day ramifications of the science issue in the jungian context behind the question of whether it is scientific or not there lie deeper issues the credibility of jung s theory personal identity as a jungian and conceptions of science wisdom and truth the book comprises a collection of erudite essays part i and linked dialogues in which the authors discuss each other s ideas part ii the authors of jung and the question of science share the conviction that the question of science is important but differ in their understanding of its applicability drawing upon their different backgrounds the authors integrate jung s insights with bodies of knowledge as diverse as neuroscience literary theory theology and political science clinical practitioners psychoanalysts psychologists scholars and students interested in the jungian perspective and the philosophy of science will find this book to be insightful and valuable

swiss psychologist carl jung 1875 1961 has made a major though still contested impact on the field of religious studies alternately revered and reviled the
