transplant which was not indigenous to or rooted in the society from which it emerged classic definitions of the european renaissance during the 14th 15th and 16th centuries have seen it as what was in effect an italian import into the gothic north yet there were certainly differences divergences and dichotomies between north and south which have to be addressed here malcolm vale argues for a northern renaissance which while cognisant of italian developments displayed strong continuities with the indigenous cultures of northern europe but it also contributed novelties and innovations which often tended to stem from and build upon those continuities a short history of the renaissance in northern europe while in no way ignoring or diminishing the importance of the hellenic and roman legacy seeks other sources and different uses of classical antiquity for a rather different kind of renaissance if such it was in the north
