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essays and artists projects explore the ubiquity of cloth in everyday life and the effect of globalization on art and labor with more than 100 color images the object of labor explores the personal political social and economic meaning of work in the context of art and textile production the ubiquity of cloth in everyday life the historically resonant relationship of textile and cloth to labor and the tumultuous drive of globalization make the issues raised by this publication of special interest today the seventeen essays cover topics ranging from art making practices to labor history and the effects of globalization as seen through art and labor the artists projects twelve striking and beautiful eight page full color spreads conduct parallel investigations into art cloth and work the contributors explore from historical and personal perspectives such subjects as the charged history of offshore garment workers the different systems of production and consumption in factories homes studios and exhibitions the revelation of class gender and sexuality through cloth costume and textile images textile production as commemorative acts in south

africa the united states and india transnationalism cultural hybridity and race in the work of individual artists lost histories of garment production and embroidery the physical act of art making as labor and the value of handmade and technologically improved objects artist projects and portfolios susie brandt nick cave park chambers lisa clark lia cook ann hamilton kimsooja barbara layne and sue rowley lara lepiónka merrill mason darrel morris pepón osorio j morgan puett and iain kerr karen reimer yinka shonibare subrosa christine tarkowski anne wilson

eileen boris explores the ways in which the arts and crafts movement was related to the trends of its time she both describes the leading participants and puts the movement into a new and larger context that involves labor as well as art

chicago was a tumultuous and exciting city in 1889 immigration industrialization urbanization and politics created a vortex of social change this lively chaos called out for both celebration and reform and two women ellen gates starr and jane addams responded to this challenge by founding the social settlement hull house although addams is one of the most famous women in american history and a major figure in sociology starr remains virtually unknown on art labor and religion is the first anthology of starr s writings and biography and makes evident her contributions to national and international sociological thought and practice

this companion is an essential contribution to the study of historical materialism in general and the social history of art in particular each chapter in the collection focuses on a key figure concept or historical epoch increasingly scholars adopt an array of marxist methods intertwined with a host of other theoretical practices particularly the historiography of key issues regarding hegemony ideology and identity ideological issues of connoisseurship patronage and analyses of the artwork as a form of labor and leisure are essential to the practice of marxisms in art history this collection spotlights a plurality of marxian theories in which the ideas of such figures as walter benjamin guy debord and t j clark are debated and developed through analyses of the socio historical conditions that impact how art is produced circulated and received this ultimately underscores that the historical contextualization of artworks and their markets within a class based society is crucial for writing socially engaged art history this book will be of interest to scholars working in art history visual studies visual sociology communication studies and the sociology of art

economics is the nexus and engine that runs society affecting societal well being raising standards of living when economies prosper or lowering citizens through class structures when economies perform poorly our society only has to witness the booms and busts of the past decade to see how economics profoundly affects the cores of societies around the world from a household budget to international trade economics ranges from the micro to the macro level it relates to a breadth of social science disciplines that help describe the content of the proposed encyclopedia which will explicitly approach economics through varied disciplinary lenses

although there are encyclopedias of covering economics especially classic economic theory and history the sage encyclopedia of economics and society emphasizes the contemporary world contemporary issues and society features 4 volumes with approximately 800 signed articles ranging from 1 000 to 5 000 words each are presented in a choice of print or electronic editions organized a to z with a thematic reader s guide in the front matter groups related entries articles conclude with references future readings to guide students to the next step on their research journeys cross references between and among articles combine with a thorough index and the reader s guide to enhance search and browse in the electronic version pedagogical elements include a chronology of economics and society resource guide and glossary this academic multi author reference work will serve as a general non technical resource for students and researchers within social science programs who seek to better understand economics through a contemporary lens

this thesis considers the relationship between art and labor in twentieth century america while examining how this informs my art practice the document aims to briefly examine karl marx theory of estranged labor hannah arendt s essay on the human condition of work and philosophers such as john ruskin and jacque ranciere while discussing the relationship between art and labor by giving a brief history of twentieth century art in reference to work and labor i plan to excavate a deeper understanding of the relationship between art labor and work the example artworks both historical and contemporary will support the accompanying sculptural pieces and provide a framework to buttress my artwork in conclusion this document will lay the foundation for comprehending the complex association between art work and labor while providing a context for a contemporary appreciation of the absent worker through art

for six years maya stovall staged liquor store theatre a conceptual art and anthropology video project included in the whitney biennial in 2017 in which she danced near the liquor stores in her detroit neighborhood as a way to start conversations with her neighbors in this book of the same name stovall uses the project as a point of departure for understanding everyday life in detroit and the possibilities for ethnographic research art and knowledge creation her conversations with her neighbors which touch on everything from economics aesthetics and sex to the political and economic racism that undergirds detroit s history bring to light rarely acknowledged experiences of longtime detroiters in these exchanges stovall enacts an innovative form of ethnographic engagement that offers new modes of integrating the social sciences with the arts in ways that exceed what either approach can achieve alone

how does the avant garde create spaces in everyday life that subvert regimes of economic and political control how do art aesthetics and activism inform one

another and how do strategic spaces of creativity become the basis for new forms of production and governance the composition of movements to come reconsiders the history and the practices of the avant garde from the situationists to the art strike revolutionary constructivism to laibach and neue slowenische kunst through an autonomist marxist framework moving the framework beyond an overly narrow class analysis the book explores broader questions of the changing nature of cultural labor and forms of resistance around this labor it examines a doubly articulated process of refusal the refusal of separating art from daily life and the re fusing of these antagonistic energies by capitalist production and governance this relationship opens up a new terrain for strategic thought in relation to everyday politics where the history of the avant garde is no longer separated from broader questions of political economy or movement but becomes a point around which to reorient these considerations

this cultural history of american federalism argues that nation building cannot be understood apart from the process of industrialization and the making of the working class in the late eighteenth century united states citing the coincidental rise of federalism and industrialism laura rigal examines the creations and performances of writers collectors engineers inventors and illustrators who assembled an early national world of things at a time when american craftsmen were transformed into wage laborers and production was rationalized mechanized and put to new ideological purposes american federalism emerges here as a culture of self making in forms as various as street parades magazine writing painting autobiography advertisement natural history collections and trials and trial transcripts chapters center on the craftsmen who celebrated the constitution by marching in philadelphia s grand federal procession of 1788 the autobiographical writings of john fitch an inventor of the steamboat before fulton the exhumation and museum display of the first american mastodon by the peale family of philadelphia joseph dennie s literary miscellany the port folio the nine volume american ornithology of alexander wilson and finally the autobiography and portrait of philadelphia locksmith pat lyon who was falsely imprisoned for bank robbery in 1798 but eventually emerged as an icon for the american working man rigal demonstrates that federalism is not merely a political movement or an artifact of language but a phenomenon of culture one among many innovations elaborated in the manufactory of early american nation building

in recent years many prominent and successful artists have claimed that their primary concern is not the artwork they produce but the artistic process itself in this volume kim grant analyzes this idea and traces its historical roots showing how changing concepts of artistic process have played a dominant role in the development of modern and contemporary art this astute account of the ways in which process has been understood and addressed examines canonical artists such as monet cézanne matisse and de kooning as well as philosophers and art theorists such as henri fochon r g collingwood and john dewey placing process art within a larger historical context grant looks at the changing relations of the artist s labor to traditional craftsmanship and industrial production the status of art as a commodity the increasing importance of the body and materiality in art making and the nature and significance of the artist s role in modern society in doing so she shows how

process is an intrinsic part of aesthetic theory that connects to important contemporary debates about work craft and labor comprehensive and insightful this synthetic study of process in modern and contemporary art reveals how artists explicit engagement with the concept fits into a broader narrative of the significance of art in the industrial and postindustrial world

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
